With much of the COVID-19 protocols now behind us, Kerrisdale is ready to embrace a more normal return to play in 2022.


While the club shall continue to always observe the Public Health Officer's orders, there is now the opportunity to enjoy the many inter-club competitions that, because of the pandemic, could not be held for the past two years.

At Elm Park, club members will have many options for play over and above daily afternoon open draws.

Beginning Wednesday, May 25, the fun Aussie Pairs night will make its long awaited return to the Kerrisdale green. Come out and enjoy a different twist to the traditional pairs game.

Also coming back after a two-year hiatus is the annual Whiskey Bowl rivalry between Kerrisdale and Dunbar club men. The all-day competition that usually follows a triples format has been tentatively scheduled for Wednesday, July 27.

In case you are wondering, Kerrisdale has dominated the rivalry over the years and is the current holder of the vessel, retaining the bowl the last time the two clubs met in 2019.

Kerrisdale will once again be hosting three Vancouver and District events as well. Like all V&D inter-club competitions, there is a registration fee to enter.

First on the agenda is the popular Diamond Doubles, an open two-day mixed pairs competition that will be held on June 29 and 30.



Norine would be proud

Next up at Elm Park will be the Norine Armstrong ladies triples to be hosted all day on July 20. This event is closed, meaning all bowlers on a team must be members of the same club. Following the ladies, comes the open Fletcher/Folz men's triples slated for Aug. 17.

BC Week, which had its beginning in 1922, is one of the longest running lawn bowls tournaments in Canada.

This highly anticipated competition runs the week of July 11 to 15, with separate events for both men and women.

Through the week, the men will contest pairs, Aussie pairs and triples at Granville Park, while the women will be at New Westminster, competing in pairs, triples and fours.

The Pennant League, which usually attracts higher calibre bowlers from all V&D clubs, has a Monday evening start date this year of June 6. The playoff finals will be played at New Westminster Lawn Bowling Club on Aug. 26.

Running the entire spring/summer season at Kerrisdale is the Tuesday morning Elm Park Triples.

Now in its third season, this mixed three-bowl, inter-club competition, created by our former treasurer David Smith, is a widely anticipated pastime with local bowlers and is a great introduction to more competitive bowling.

Teams are now forming so don't delay. Kerrisdale has spots for just four teams.

PIBC, which is located near Queen Elizabeth Park, is the only regulation indoor facility in Canada. It provides league games and open practice for bowlers of all abilities.

Berridge and first-year bowler Suphin Nakutnok took home the runner-up prize money in the B Group playoff of the Wednesday Afternoon Intermediate Pairs.

Kerrisdale members Alice Kwan, Barrie Brown and Jack Green also took advantage of the world class indoor facility this season.
